Former mayor to help raise funds for handicapped-accessible playground

POCATELLO — Another extreme makeover project is coming to town, but this time the undertaking will involve a playground.

A very big and special playground.

Organizers of the planned Brooklyn's Playground project have enlisted the help of former Pocatello Mayor Roger Chase to lead the effort to raise the estimated \$400,000 that will be needed to build a massive community playground.

About 2,000 community volunteers will build the 20,000-square-foot playground at O.K. Ward Park in five days in September.

The project, which is being led by the community organization, Valley Pride, in conjunction with the United Way of Southeastern Idaho, is a grassroots effort to build a state-ofthe-art playground that is accessible to everyone. The playground equipment will be soft and round and 100 percent accessible to children with handicaps.

Even children in wheelchairs will have access to all of the ground-level components. They can take their chairs up the ramps to the top where there are transfer points for easy access to the slides.

Project organizers say the playground will be filled with fun creative playground equipment that fosters learning through imaginative play. The playground will include features such as interactive panels, cooperative games, climbers, music areas, sensory panels and a phone system.
